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Introduction to the Voter Guide

Church Voter Guides NETN is an independent, grassroots nonprofit organization. We serve the public by providing objective research and education on matters specifically of interest to Christians, primarily through the production and distribution of 501 (c)(3)-compliant, nonpartisan voter guides.

Church Voter Guides does not endorse or oppose any candidates for public office or any political party.

Church Voter Guides initially started in Colorado Springs in April of 2021 and was adopted by Chattanooga / Hamilton County in 2022. Church Voter Guides NETN is brand new to Northeast Tennessee in time for the November General Election 2024. This new Voter Guide is being distributed electronically only, through our interactive website, by downloadable and printable PDF files, and on handheld devices. We have produced one Voter Guide for each Contested race in Washington and Sullivan Counties. We eventually plan to cover races in all 7 counties in Northeast Tennessee. Our Voter Guides are being promoted through a wide-ranging network of area churches, faith-based non-profit organizations, mainstream and social media, and other means.

The purpose of our Voter Guides is to educate and inform voters of each candidate's positions on a variety of policy issues that they are likely to address if elected. As a Voter Guide designed to be distributed through Churches, we ask the candidates questions on topics that are of utmost interest to the Christian voter

How to Get the Most Benefit from this Voter Guide

The core information in this Voter Guide comes directly from the County General Elections candidates themselves. We asked them questions, they answered (with a 120 word limit), and we have published their responses here. In order to understand and and utilize this information to the fullest, so that you may vote in the mostinformed way, we suggest the following:

- 1. Pray and ask the Almighty for discernment. The Kingdom of God is all about truth, while politics is a system fraught with compromise. Make sure you consider the candidates' answers with a Heavenly mindset.
- 2. Ask yourself, "Did the candidate actually answer the question, or rather side-step it, or give a fluff, wishywashy, and/or 'political' type answer that leaves you not really knowing where he/she truly stands on the issue?"
- 3. Learn more about the candidates running for Johnson City Commissioner including their positions on issues we did not cover in our questionnaire, by visiting their official campaign websites (if they have one.) The website URL for each candidate is listed in the Voter Guide.
- 4. Educate yourself more about the Christian/Biblical perspective regarding many of the subjects covered in our Voter Guide by reading topical articles on other websites.
- 5. Use search engines to find additional information about each candidate, including written articles and videos, other voter guides, and even voting records for those who have served in public office before. You may even want to watch online recordings of the local Johnson City Commissioner meetings to see how incumbents conduct themselves and vote.
- 6. Reach out to the candidates themselves through the provided email addresses and other means, in order to ask them questions of personal importance to you. Please make sure to show great respect toward each candidate and his/her time, especially to those with whom you disagree. Running for office is hard, stressful, time consuming work, and these are your fellow citizens who have lives, families, jobs...and feelings (just like you!)



What makes a Voter Guide 501 (c)(3) - Compliant and Nonpartisan?

Federal tax law permits nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations to develop and distribute materials about political candidates' positions on issues, in order to educate voters impartially and on a nonpartisan basis; meaning that it is free from party affiliation, bias, or designation. The IRS states that 501 (c)(3) organizations may conduct any range of activities to promote voter participation and educate voters so long as it is nonpartisan. But, 501(c)(3) organizations are explicitly prohibited from supporting or opposing candidates for public office.

Some of the activities 501(c)(3) nonprofits *MAY* perform: Conduct or promote voter registration; educate voters on the voting process; distribute nonpartisan sample ballots, candidate questionnaires, and *voter guides*; organize "get-out-the-vote" activities; encourage and help people to vote; educate the candidates on issues important to their organization; and continue to do issue advocacy during an election.

So, first and foremost: *Church Voter Guides* does **NOT** endorse or oppose any candidates for public office or any political party.

Second, all of our staff and volunteers are required to act in a nonpartisan manner when working for or representing the organization and the creation of the Voter Guide.

Third, we do not edit, revise, or editorialize candidate responses to our Questionnaire. We do not even correct typos. **Candidate answers are published verbatim**, ensuring that their responses accurately represent their positions and perspectives on these issues. We then simply share this information through the Voter Guide, and you decide whom you believe to be the best candidate.

To be fair and impartial, we reached out by email, text, and phone when determined necessary, to all registered candidates running for Johnson City Commissioner inviting them to answer our questionnaire. Candidate information is presented in alphabetical order by **last name**. If a Candidate did not respond at all, or did not choose to participate, or did not choose to respond to certain answers in the questionnaire, then it is noted where applicable. If there were not enough candidates running, then we did not produce a Voter Guide for that seat.



1) Political Leanings: As a candidate in the Johnson City nonpartisan municipal election, you are not officially associated with any specific political party. How would you describe your political leanings (socially, fiscally, etc.) and why do you define yourself in this way?

I am a fiscal conservative, focusing on reducing the deficit and lowering taxes to foster economic growth. My active involvement in Highland Baptist Church is an important part of my commitment to conservative values. As a member of the East Tennessee Republican Club, I connect with others who share my dedication to conservative principles. By prioritizing responsible financial management and community engagement, I aim to ensure a bright future for Johnson City.



2) Your Experience and Vision: What experience (personal, professional, other) would you bring to your role as a Commissioner that will benefit our city? What is your vision for being a Commissioner, and what do you hope to accomplish during your first year in office?

I bring a diverse background that combines community involvement, professional experience, and a commitment to public service. My role on the board of the Academy of Strings has allowed me to engage with the community, promoting arts education and fostering youth development. Additionally, my experience as a project manager overseeing multimillion-dollar projects has equipped me with strong organizational and financial management skills, essential for effective governance. As a Commissioner, my vision is to enhance Johnson City's quality of life through responsible fiscal policies and community engagement. During my first year in office, I aim to initiate discussions on budget transparency, identify opportunities for tax relief, and support initiatives that promote local businesses.

3) Moral Values: Could you share your viewpoint on how the moral principles of the Ten Commandments intersect or diverge from the principles underlying governmental laws, ordinances, and regulations? Please elaborate on your viewpoint and reasoning.

The law can be summarized by two commands: Love God and Love your neighbor as yourself. Loving God involves valuing His truth and justice, while a love for God among officials often leads to better laws. However, moral principles like the Ten Commandments can influence any government through God's common grace. Loving one's neighbor is essential for a just society, encouraging actions that consider others' well-being. Laws reflecting this love promote fairness and support, addressing community needs. It's crucial for local governments to listen to their communities rather than focusing on ideals that don't represent their desires.

4) Defending Constitutional Liberties: Many Americans believe that the government at every level is not securing their Creator-given rights, but rather encroaching on them. Established freedoms, including that of speech, peaceable assembly, exercise of religion, medical autonomy, and commerce are often negatively impacted by state and federal regulations, and were greatly infringed upon by COVID mandates. As a Commissioner, how will you protect Johnson City residents from current and future unconstitutional government overreach?

Now that we have the benefit of hindsight regarding COVID-19, it's about time to review our local response and implement ordinance-level safeguards for future pandemics. One effective measure against governmental overreach is the nullification bills proposed in Nashville, which the city commission can support through non-binding resolutions. Additionally, the concept of "sanctuary cities" offers another approach to protect clearly defined constitutional liberties. While I am against making Johnson City a sanctuary for drugs and illegal immigration, I am open to exploring this option as a way to prevent specific encroachments on our constitutional rights.



5) Utilities/Infrastructure: As a Commissioner, what is your plan to (1) shift Johnson City toward renewable energy sources, (2) work with Brightridge and TVA to address energy need increases as well as protecting our electrical grid, (3) address the future water needs of Johnson City as our city continues to grow in population? Additionally, would you support bringing into Johnson City/Washington County another supercomputing (bitcoin) facility?

(1) Nuclear is a great renewable energy source, but that's more of a TVA decision. We need to be cautious about solar panels and other projects that could "greenwash" our city by making it look environmentally friendly while providing little more than a costly show of support for renewable energy sources. (2) To answer a later question, it might be a good idea to avoid tying up our electrical grid mining bitcoin. (3) Water is a critical infrastructure need for Johnson City. The water department has been well funded in recent years and I would like to see this trend continue. (4) Bitcoin mining is a blight that doesn't create jobs... just a bunch of noise and electricity use.

6) Crime and Police: Nationwide crime rates are rising, while Police Department recruitment is down. As a Commissioner, what will you do to ensure citizens are protected from crime, including improving recruitment, morale, and response time within the Johnson City Police Department?

To ensure the Johnson City Police Department effectively addresses rising crime rates, we must prioritize essential city services in our budget. This includes enhancing recruitment efforts with targeted campaigns and partnerships with ETSU and local colleges to attract diverse candidates. We should also invest in officer wellness programs and ongoing training to boost morale and improve community relations. Continuing to upgrade technology and resources will enhance response times and efficiency as well.

7) Protecting the Most Vulnerable: As a Commissioner, how will you ensure the protection of the most vulnerable in our city, including the lives of the unborn, the trafficked, and the elderly?

I am interested in seeing a baby box be installed in the Johnson City area. Engaging with faith-based groups is essential in efforts to protect the lives of the unborn and to combat human trafficking. These organizations often have deep community connections and can mobilize resources for outreach, education, and support services. As for the elderly, we need to freeze property tax increases that disproportionally affect the elderly living on fixed incomes. Additionally, we should promote more healthcare options by passing resolutions to eliminate the certificate of need system, breaking the Ballad monopoly and encouraging greater competition in our healthcare market.

8) Business/jobs: What specifically should the City Commission do, if anything, to bring more businesses/jobs to Johnson City? What sector(s) would you most like to see relocate here?

I have worked on the Johnson City Industrial Development Board to bring more jobs to the city. We currently need to expand industrial jobs. With the growth of higher-paying industrial jobs, other service sector jobs will be created as well. Unfortunately, the city is currently focusing on shopping and tourism. This focus needs to shift. This can be addressed with zoning decisions, strategic plans with the city planner, and TIF/PILOT incentives targeted at growing our industrial sector.



9) Affordable Housing: As more and more people move to Northeast Tennessee/the Tri-Cities area in general, what can be done to provide affordable housing while also retaining our city's unique character and environment that have made it such a popular place to live?

We need continued investment in our roads to distribute the impact of population growth. The city's current plan emphasizes the use of HOAs to create cookie-cutter communities, which threatens the variety that makes Johnson City a nice place to own a home. HOA costs are also quietly raising the cost of housing in our area. We need to make all HOA agreements a matter of public record. This will let us track the impact of HOAs and protect residents. For future development, we should focus on encouraging a mix of housing types, including affordable options, that reflect the diversity of our residents. Promoting infill development and revitalizing existing neighborhoods can help maintain our community's character while accommodating new residents.

10) Homelessness/Vagrancy: How can the City Commission address the increase in the homeless/vagrant population in our city in ways that best serve all Johnson City residents?

We need to consider the potential ramifications of making the entirety of Johnson City walkable, as increased walkability can inadvertently attract homeless individuals seeking access to services. It may be necessary to relocate some homeless aid services. However, I strongly oppose the current city plan that weaponizes our code enforcement to target and close "undesirable" ministries such as the Haven of Mercy. My father helped oppose the city's attempts to close the Haven of Mercy, and I oppose any unconstitutional policies that violate Johnson City residents fifth amendment rights against takings. Relocating services will require a partnership with existing faith based aid organizations and a significant investment on the part of the city.

11) Impact of Drug Use on Our Community: Our area has been negatively highlighted regarding the Opioid/Fentanyl crisis. What do you believe should be done to protect our city and its residents, and especially our youth, from the negative physical, mental, emotional, social, and economic impacts of drug use and abuse?

This is a complex issue requiring more than 120 words, but in short, more drugs are not the answer to the drug problem. While Methadone can be a useful tool in treating individuals, we must focus on a comprehensive approach that includes prevention, education, and support. What we can't do is simply prescribe a substitute drug and count people as cured. Expanding access to addiction treatment services is crucial, as is increasing funding for mental health resources to address the underlying issues that often lead to substance abuse.



12) Engagement with the Faith Community: Johnson City has a large, diverse, and well-established religious community, consisting predominantly of those practicing some form of Christianity, and is home to hundreds of local churches and international parachurch ministries. What is your current engagement with the local faith community, and how do you plan to interact with and represent your constituents in your role as a City Commissioner?

I'm very active in my local church, Highland Baptist Church. I teach an adult Sunday School class every week and provide pulpit supply services when our pastor is unable to attend. I would like to encourage the faith community to be more engaged in local community events such as the meet the mountains and blue plum festivals.

How would you describe your political leanings (socially, fiscally, etc.) and why do you define yourself in this way?

As a candidate, I consider myself fiscally conservative and a firm believer in capitalism, where the government's role is to support the people, not control them. I value personal responsibility, limited government, and adherence to the Constitution, which I see as essential to preserving American values. Socially, I recognize the importance of respecting individual rights and freedoms, and, I find comfort in my own deep personal Christian beliefs and choose to share those beliefs by loving and appreciating my entire community. My approach is focused on promoting economic growth and maintaining a fair, accountable government while ensuring that all citizens have the opportunity to thrive.

Experience in Real Estate, land development requiring new public infrastructure, renovating historic structures, repurposing dilapidated structures into multi-use properties, and construction, has earned me experience as a consumer. Additionally, would you support bringing into Johnson City/Washington County another supercomputing (bitcoin) facility?

1.) I will rely on experts to guide decisions on shifting to renewable energy, considering factors like cost, efficiency, and feasibility. 2.) Brightridge is a strong organization, and as Commissioner, I will support its efforts in collaboration with TVA to address energy needs and protect our electrical grid. 3.) While Johnson City's water supply is outstanding, I will work to identify and address any weaknesses to ensure we meet future demands as the city grows. 4.) I believe decisions about a supercomputing (bitcoin) facility or any other private company should be left to the free market for those decisions.

6) Crime and Police: Nationwide crime rates are rising, while Police Department recruitment is down. As a Commissioner, what will you do to ensure citizens are protected from crime, including improving recruitment, morale, and response time within the Johnson City Police Department?

I believe morale and culture are key to addressing recruitment and retention issues within the Johnson City Police Department. As Commissioner, I will focus on fostering a strong, supportive culture where officers know how much our community appreciates and relies on them. Ensuring they have the proper tools, training, and resources is crucial to their success. A positive department culture can help improve recruitment, boost morale, and address gaps in other areas. By working closely with law enforcement, I aim to improve response times and ensure our citizens feel safe and protected from rising crime.



7) Protecting the Most Vulnerable: As a Commissioner, how will you ensure the protection of the most vulnerable in our city, including the lives of the unborn, the trafficked, and the elderly?

As a City Commissioner, I believe my role is to foster a positive culture and set the tone for our community by promoting strong values and public awareness. I believe the City Commission should focus on growing the quality of jobs we already have and filling those needs with current citizens before focusing on recruitment. We need to ensure we're producing high-quality nurses and teachers, as they are vital to our community and have significant impacts. Johnson City already offers excellent educational opportunities—let's build a culture that encourages our best and brightest to stay here for both education and careers. By fostering this environment, we can attract businesses and create a thriving community that supports local talent.

9) Affordable Housing: As more and more people move to Northeast Tennessee/the Tri-Cities area in general, what can be done to provide affordable housing while also retaining our city's unique character and environment that have made it such a popular place to live?

This issue is a huge passion of mine and involves many moving parts. To provide affordable housing while retaining our city's unique character, we should focus on repurposing existing and underperforming properties. Create mixed-use developments that build off current infrastructure which can significantly reduce cost. Looking at our zoning requirements and allowing more flexibility and reducing initial subdivision requirements for new projects. This needs to be a focus of our community and will be a focus of mine as a Commissioner.

10) Homelessness/Vagrancy: How can the City Commission address the increase in the homeless/vagrant population in our city in ways that best serve all Johnson City residents?

The Commission must tackle the rising homeless population. Many local organizations have good intentions, yet not achieving the desired results. It's essential to unite stakeholders and set aside ego to develop a cohesive strategy for a common goal. 





As a public servant, I believe these moral guidelines help inform our approach to governance, focusing on fostering a community that values personal responsibility, integrity, and respect for one another.



4) Defending Constitutional Liberties: Many Americans believe that the government at every level is not securing their Creator-given rights, but rather encroaching on them. Established freedoms, including that of speech, peaceable assembly, exercise of religion, medical autonomy, and commerce are often negatively impacted by state and federal regulations, and were greatly infringed upon by COVID mandates. As a Commissioner, how will you protect Johnson City residents from current and future unconstitutional government overreach?

It's important to recognize that, as a City Commissioner, my role is defined by the authority granted in the city charter. The authority of the City Commission is limited, so we must ensure that we operate within boundaries while respecting constitutional rights. As a Commissioner, I intend to honor the freedoms of Johnson City residents by adhering to the charter and ensuring any regulations or ordinances passed are necessary, measured, and entirely within the scope of our authority. By maintaining transparency and accountability, I work to ensure our local government remains focused on serving the community's best interests, respecting both the rights of individuals and the proper role of government as outlined in our city's governing documents.

5) Utilities/Infrastructure: As a Commissioner, what is your plan to (1) shift Johnson City toward renewable energy sources, (2) work with Brightridge and TVA to address energy need increases as well as protecting our electrical grid, (3) address the future water needs of Johnson City as our city continues to grow in population? Additionally, would you support bringing into Johnson City/Washington County another supercomputing (bitcoin) facility?

As Commissioner, I will prioritize the security of Johnson City's energy grid by working with public utilities to ensure it remains reliable and protected, especially as demand grows. We must also provide a safe and reliable water supply, and I will support infrastructure upgrades to meet future needs while maintaining water quality. Regarding a Bitcoin facility, I do not support recruiting such an operation to Johnson City. However, the city cannot entirely prohibit such developments, so it's essential to strike a balance by thoroughly understanding the potential impact on our energy grid, environment, and community. My focus is on safeguarding Johnson City's long-term sustainability and security. Ultimately, my focus is on protecting residents' quality of life through responsible planning.

6) Crime and Police: Nationwide crime rates are rising, while Police Department recruitment is down. As a Commissioner, what will you do to ensure citizens are protected from crime, including improving recruitment, morale, and response time within the Johnson City Police Department?

As Commissioner, I have prioritized public safety by ensuring the Johnson City Police Department has the resources needed to protect our community. While the JCPD has not faced recruitment challenges, I will support ongoing efforts to maintain competitive salaries, benefits, and incentives to attract and retain top recruits. Enhancing officer morale is also important, and I will advocate for ongoing training, health resources, and recognition programs to honor our officers' service and ensure they are adequately prepared. To maintain our efficient response times, I will continue to support investment in technology, increased staffing where needed, and efficient resource management. My goal is to ensure the JCPD remains fully equipped to keep Johnson City safe and responsive to our community's needs.



7) Protecting the Most Vulnerable: As a Commissioner, how will you ensure the protection of the most vulnerable in our city, including the lives of the unborn, the trafficked, and the elderly?

As a Commissioner, I am committed to protecting the most vulnerable in Johnson City. Our ongoing support for the Family Justice Center is a key part of that commitment. The Center provides a centralized location where victims of family violence, sexual assault, and elder abuse can access critical services to ensure their safety and well-being. Additionally, we have strengthened law enforcement by adding more than 20 sworn officers and creating a Special Victims Unit focused on investigating particularly heinous crimes, including sexual assault and human trafficking. I will continue to support these efforts, working to safeguard the elderly and those affected by violence or exploitation. I aim to ensure Johnson City remains a place where everyone is protected and supported.

8) Business/jobs: What specifically should the City Commission do, if anything, to bring more businesses/jobs to Johnson City? What sector(s) would you most like to see relocate here?

The City Commission is focused on creating an environment that attracts businesses and promotes job growth by maintaining vital infrastructure, streamlining regulatory processes, and offering competitive incentives for companies to relocate or expand their existing operations in Johnson City. Collaboration with local economic development organizations is key to targeting industries that align with our community's strengths. I would like to see growth in healthcare, technology, and advanced manufacturing sectors. These industries provide high-quality jobs and complement Johnson City's existing strengths, such as our medical facilities and educational institutions. By focusing on sectors promoting long-term, sustainable growth, we can ensure Johnson City remains a place where our children and grandchildren can build their homes, prosper, and thrive for generations to come.

9) Affordable Housing: As more and more people move to Northeast Tennessee/the Tri-Cities area in general, what can be done to provide affordable housing while also retaining our city's unique character and environment that have made it such a popular place to live?

As more people move to the Tri-Cities, it's crucial to strike a balance between providing affordable housing and preserving Johnson City's unique character. The City Commission can encourage responsible growth by promoting mixed-use developments and incentivizing builders to include affordable housing options in their plans. Additionally, we can explore creative zoning solutions that allow for higher-density housing in appropriate areas while protecting established neighborhoods and green spaces. Maintaining our city's character means ensuring that new developments complement our local culture and environment. By prioritizing smart, sustainable growth, we can provide housing that meets the needs of new residents without compromising what makes Johnson City a special place to live. This will help ensure long-term prosperity while preserving our community's charm.



10) Homelessness/Vagrancy: How can the City Commission address the increase in the homeless/vagrant population in our city in ways that best serve all Johnson City residents?

The City Commission seeks to address the homeless population through its ongoing initiative to improve coordination of services across local nonprofits, shelters, and faith-based organizations. By working to ensure access to mental health care, substance abuse treatment, job training, and other critical services, we can help individuals transition from homelessness to becoming productive, independent contributors to our community. Expanding partnerships for transitional and affordable housing will further support this goal. Our focus should remain on helping individuals regain stability and independence while ensuring our public spaces remain safe and accessible for all residents. By emphasizing rehabilitation and reintegration, we can create long-term solutions that benefit both the homeless population and the broader Johnson City community.

11) Impact of Drug Use on Our Community: Our area has been negatively highlighted regarding the Opioid/Fentanyl crisis. What do you believe should be done to protect our city and its residents, and especially our youth, from the negative physical, mental, emotional, social, and economic impacts of drug use and abuse?

The opioid and fentanyl crisis is a critical issue, and protecting Johnson City from its harmful impacts requires a multi-faceted approach. First, we must continue supporting law enforcement efforts to combat drug trafficking and hold those responsible for distributing these dangerous substances accountable. In addition, expanding prevention and education programs in schools is essential to help our youth fully understand the risks of drug use and abuse. We should leverage existing partnerships with various service providers to increase access to treatment and recovery programs. Providing comprehensive support for those affected by substance abuse is crucial to addressing the crisis's impacts. 12) Engagement with the Faith Community: Johnson City has a large, diverse, and well-established religious community, consisting predominantly of those practicing some form of Christianity, and is home to hundreds of local churches and international parachurch ministries. What is your current engagement with the local faith community, and how do you plan to interact with and represent your constituents in your role as a City Commissioner?
